Burnaby Family Life (BFL) envisions a healthy and inclusive community where individuals and families can thrive.

At its conception in 1971, BFL was an organization formed to respond to the changing social environment and needs of individuals and families in Burnaby. According to "Understanding and Dismantling Impacts of Racism on Racialized Communities in Burnaby" a report commissioned by BFL, it was highlighted that immigrants make up 50.38% of Burnaby's population, "Burnaby is now a hyper diverse city, with 67% of the population identifying as visible minorities, the second highest percentage of visible minorities in Metro Vancouver and these residents bring their intellectual and artistic talents, cultures, languages and worldviews from a wide range of countries".



The social services sector in which we operate our services continues to recognize the need for change to address the complex social environment and BFL, in our second year of our strategic plan, continues to contemplate transformation amid growth and strengthening of our internal structures and we saw many exciting things happen this past year.

In January Montecito became a \$10aDay ChildCare Centre, officially making all three of our childcare centres a part of the provincial \$10aDay initiative.

Our commitment to equity, diversity, inclusion, and reconciliation has led us to grow and learn as an organization and look within. We challenged our own biases, focus on outcomes and understand that this process must be intentional, continuous, and adaptive as we move forward.

Technology has become a vital part of our operations, and through the launch of our new accessible website, we have found that it has allowed us to deepen our reach of services into the community. In this year we have continued to upgrade all IT structures, and updated our operating systems, allowing for increased efficiency and effectiveness.

At the core of the organization is the staff. The internal environment in which we operate is reliant upon the interpersonal connections between staff and each client we serve. We are filled with gratitude for the dedication of our staff, Board of Directors, volunteers, and funders and recognize that it is through their trust in our organization that allows us to continue to provide much needed programs and services within the community of Burnaby.





2022-2023 REVENUE SOURCES



The yearly revenue total is the highest ever recorded by Burnaby Family Life and represents our constant innovation and search for new funding to enhance services and programs we deliver in the community. Overall revenues increased by 8% over the prior year with new additional programming funded through provincial and federal grants.

We are pleased to report on the financial performance of Burnaby Family Life for the fiscal year ending March 31, 2023., which resulted in an excess of revenue.

This year we saw a program change that impacted on our service to the community as our Montecito Child Care Centre became our third \$10 a Day ChildCareBC Centre, which is an exciting opportunity for BFL and our clients.



The Burnaby South Child Care Centre provides quality licensed child care for children between eight weeks and three years of age with a primary focus on supporting the Young Parent Program, a program focused on supporting families while attending secondary school. In working with young parents, staff recognized the importance of providing response services, by providing childcare past school hours and within the summer months.

As we began this year, family and staff continued to adapt and change processes and procedures to maintain health and safety.

At Burnaby South staff recognized the importance of building connections amongst families attending the Centre and the community. Innovations such as a monthly newsletter were created, and family get togethers occurred. It was reported by families that they increased their awareness of available resources and supports.

Staff at Burnaby South worked to maintain quality childcare by investing in weekly training with a Pedagogist from the Early Childhood Pedagogist Network, training on the Early Learning Framework, and participation in the Annual Alliance of Professionals Serving Young Parent Conference. Our commitment to training and supporting future educators in the field was maintained as Burnaby South supported practicum students from Vancouver Community College, Douglas College, and Vancouver Career College.

Burnaby South Child Care Centre



The Prevention, Education, Advocacy, Counselling and Empowerment (PEACE) program is an intervention and prevention program for children and youth, ages three to 18, who witnessed domestic violence and abuse. The goal of the program is to help children and youth heal from the trauma they have experienced and to interrupt the cycle of intergenerational abuse.

This year we were able to offer our individual counselling services in-person, or remotely via telephone and online. This school year we continued to offer Open Art Studio at Burnaby Youth Hub to serve vulnerable youth in our community.

We continue to get positive reviews and encouragement from the school district, caregivers, and school staffs to continue with the Violence Is Preventable (VIP) group facilitation program which offers psychoeducation and awareness of emotional process.

The **Stopping the Violence (STV) Counselling** service provides free individual counselling and therapy groups for women who have experienced abuse (i.e., physical, sexual and/or emotional, including witnessing domestic violence in childhood). The mission of the program is to educate, support and empower women, so they may heal from the impacts of trauma and lead healthier and more productive lives.

This service area provides individual counselling and a range of therapy groups. In summer 2022, we provided the Healing Journey group virtually online for our clients. This opportunity gave us an overview of counselling department versatility and ability to adapt to external transitions and changes. Post pandemic we continued to see an increased need for counselling services. Our team responded to these extensive waitlists by offering a virtual online groups.

According to our surveys and feedback we received from our clientele, we observed an increase in request for group counselling services. We have added an additional group offerings to our counselling services during the summer season.





The **Children's Program** provides quality care for children ages 18 months to 12 years for parents and caregivers participating in different BFL programs. We believe that all children are entitled to safe and healthy child care that encourages their physical, emotional, social, intellectual, and cultural development, respects diversity and supports their families. Service areas include child care for 14 different adult programs, Monday through Saturday, during morning, afternoon, and evening sessions. We provided childcare for 39 different groups through the year.

As Burnaby Family Life continues to provide responsive programs such as Curious Minds, and Support & Peer Group for Parents of 2SLGBTQIA+ Children/Youth, child-minding has been extended to allow for participation. In addition to our Family Life Education programs, child care is also provided for our Pregnancy Outreach Programs as well as programs such as Nobody's Perfect, Systematic Training for Effective Parenting, Single Mother's Support Group, Immigrant Women's Support Group, Parenting for Immigrants, Calm & Confident Parenting, Curious Minds, and Fatherhood, a Journey.

This year 76% or participants have a first language other than English. This language barrier can lead to difficulties settling in and intensify separation anxiety. To address this, we work to address this by trying to recruit multilingual volunteers and staff to create a positive and inclusive environment. Our goal is to ensure that all children feel supported and engaged in our programs, providing enriching experiences for each child.

The Family Life Education Program provides a variety of parenting and support groups for individuals to create healthy and nurturing environments for their families and themselves, in a diverse community. Additionally, our services encourage the successful settlement and integration of immigrants and promote the acceptance of diverse cultures in Canadian society.

All programs are provided in a group format, guided by a facilitator, balancing group activities and discussions with structured learning. Each session provides education and discussion on topics related to parenting, child development and personal growth. Participants socialize and share their experiences with each other which can lead to building lasting social connections.

One of our most significant achievements this year has been the establishment of the Support & Peer Group for Parents of 2SLGBTQIA+ Children/Youth program. Another accomplishment was the well-received workshop titled "Let's talk about sexuality," which aimed to demystify the topic. This workshop, led by PossAbilities, resonated with parents and further contributed to our efforts in providing valuable resources and support to the community.

These achievements signify our commitment to meeting the diverse needs of parents and families in our community. We look forward to expanding and enhancing our programs and workshops, striving to create an inclusive, caring, and supportive environment for all participants.

The Family Resource Program (FRP) provides a range of services to support parents and caregivers, including Family Drop-ins, Learning Together Through Play, Baby & Me and Mother Goose. The program goals are to strengthen healthy family-child relationships through opportunities for parents and caregivers to become informed of and involved in supporting the positive development of children within the context of the family. All programs value cultural diversity and provide opportunities to increase each family's knowledge of children's health and development, knowledge of community resources and opportunities for family networking and advocacy.

It is with a deep sense of respect and humility that the Family Resource Programs' team would like to share its sincere efforts this year to learn, celebrate, and raise awareness about the rich heritage, culture, and knowledge of Indigenous Peoples. To achieve this, we implemented a curriculum that serves as a valuable resource for Family Resource Programs to foster awareness and combat racism through the spirit of reconciliation. The modules and materials provided aim to serve as a starting point for children, parents, and caregivers in our programs to share and reflect upon.

We continue to listen to the evolving needs and challenges of the families that come to our programs and make every effort to address them. For example, we have been able to continue offering the outdoor Family Drop-ins in the parks in the Summer even after the pandemic. This has helped us to promote the significance of outdoor play for the healthy physical, cognitive, and social development of children.

Family Resource Program



Montecito Child Care Centre is located on the grounds of Montecito Elementary and serves children between the ages of thirty months to five years old. We believe children are unique individuals who are capable and independent with different strengths and learning methods. Our program provides an inclusive environment to meet each child's developmental milestones by using their interests and creating ageappropriate activities to help each child reach their full potential.

Staff continuously work together with families with open and respectful communication, providing resources and support to connect them with one another and to the broader community.

We continue to work closely with the BC Centre for Ability as they provide us with funding for one-on-one support for some of our children and have also provided resources and tools to use in our program. We saw tremendous growth in the children supported through this program.

For most of the year, Montecito was funded through client user fees, however, on January 1st, 2023, funding was provided by BC Ministry of Education and Child Care for Montecito to become a part of the \$10aDay ChildCare BC program. We are excited for this wonderful opportunity for our Montecito families.

Moving Ahead is designed to provide support for Government Assisted Refugees and vulnerable immigrant populations facing significant barriers to settlement and integration in Canada. The primary goal of the program is to empower vulnerable immigrants through intensive one-on-one case management in the client's first language, offering various education and support programs to help them overcome obstacles and achieve their settlement goals.

We are proud to be a part of the Innovative BC Settlement Case Management Service Model Project, led by MOSAIC in partnership with researchers from UBC. This collaborative project aims to enhance the existing Settlement Case Management Model, with the overarching objective of supporting vulnerable members of Canadian society to fully participate and contribute to society.

With digital and computer literacy becoming essential to access many services like banking, credit card services, welfare/income assistance services, paystubs, and tax documents, our clients have requested support in this area. This shift in increased technology impacts our clients, as many have little to no literacy skills and have no experience with living and working in urban environments.

To respond to this changing social environment, our case managers have dedicated considerable time and effort to educate and support clients with digital literacy so that they can independently access online services.

Morley Child Care Centre offers three licensed programs at our centre: Daycare (children between 3 and 5), Preschool (children between 30 months to five years old) and Out-of-School Care (from Kindergarten to Grade 5). We believe each child develops at an individual pace and each has unique strengths, interests, personality and ways of learning. Our programs provide an inclusive environment that supports children in meeting developmental milestones and reaching their own full potential through age-appropriate programming.

We continually look for opportunities to connect families with community resources, and develop a connection between the children's centre, home and the community. Increasing communication and building connections was a focus for the staff.

Creative ideas such as interactive boards illustrating progress, individual learnings and parental encouragement were developed. A monthly newsletter was also created and served as a vehicle to bridge learnings, and increase awareness of community supports.

Morley Child Care Centre proudly continues to be a \$10 a Day ChildCareBC Centre and are grateful for the support this gives our families.

Pre and Post Natal Services offer services to promote positive health and wellness with at-risk women through education and support in a safe and inclusive environment. The program serves women struggling with multiple barriers that could impact their pregnancy or postpartum journey. We strive to improve mother and infant health, foster social and community networks, and empower women to their fullest potential. This program is delivered through continuous care in group and one-to-one outreach services.

Our clients often share the feeling of belonging, safety, and support they get from our groups and outreach services. The team works to ensure that every group session feels warm, inviting, and safe regardless of a person's background, religion, or life experience. Our multi-disciplinary team is focused on maternal well-being, newborn care and development, and nutrition.

This year, BFL was once again a host agency for a pilot project called the **Healthy Care Pregnancy Program** (HCPP). The objective of the program is to support women with a history of, or who are currently using, substances and are pregnant or up to 7 months postpartum, providing them with wrap-around support in-home, community, and acute care settings.

We have successfully supported families in getting housing, reuniting with their cultural history or traditions, and feeling better about themselves through mental and emotional support. Goals of the program are to promote and maintain mother-baby togetherness, increase support for parenting, breastfeeding education, improve overall wellbeing, and empower women who are enrolled to make the best decisions for themselves and their baby.

We would also like to thank both the Provincial Health Services Authority for funding the project and the BC Association of Pregnancy Outreach Programs for their administration of the HCPP project and funds.





Pre and Postnatal Services



Our LINC Child-minding Program provides quality care in a safe and caring environment for children while their parents or guardians participate in Language Instruction for Newcomer to Canada (LINC). The licensed child-minding program has been delivered by BFL since 2011 and offers services to children from 18 months up to six years (school age). Various learning opportunities are provided to support the early learning and development of children of immigrant families. The program values cultural diversity and aims to increase the family's knowledge of children's health and development, community resources and opportunities for family networking and advocacy. The learning and growth of each child and the smooth adjustment of the family into their new communities is important and valuable to the LINC Programs.

Burnaby Family Life is partnered with two different agencies for the LINC Child-minding Program: the Burnaby School District and MOSAIC. This program is delivered at three locations: Brentwood Learning Centre, Edmonds Resource Centre, and Windsor Adult Education Centre.

Trust is essential between educators and families and this process takes time as we work to build relationships with the children and their families to learn about the child and their individual needs. We are committed to ensuring that each family feels comfortable and supported during their time with us. In supporting the individual needs of the children, staff work closely with paraprofessionals in the community such as, BC Centre for Abilities, Kinsight, speech and language pathologists, dental hygienists, and librarians.

This year LINC staff offered two innovative programs, HSBC Literacy Workshop and the Healthy Habits program. We continue to build relationships with each other, our families, the adult LINC educators, and the community. We are open to engaging in ideas that will bring us together and look forward to finding more ways to connect.

Each of the five goal areas represent a vital aspect of our mission to empower immigrants and foster a strong sense of community belonging.

EMPLOYMENT

One of our key objectives was to ensure that Burnaby immigrants have access to services and supports that enhance their employment opportunities. Through strategic partnerships and hosting events, we worked diligently to bridge the gap and empower newcomers to succeed in the workforce, thus contributing to their personal growth and economic stability. The employment events were well attended by both employment seekers as well as organizations looking to grow.

We participated in Task Force for Retrofit and Climate change. By embracing unique cultural backgrounds and perspectives, we aspired to create a richer, more vibrant community.

INTERCULTURAL CONNECTION

To build a harmonious and connected community, we placed a strong emphasis on fostering intercultural connections. During the year we held working groups meetings, encouraging active participation in the growth and development of their neighborhoods. We conducted racism research, attended conferences and presented on the Burnaby Newcomer Inclusion Initiative Project. We sought to create an inclusive environment where immigrants feel valued, and welcomed.

By breaking down barriers and fostering transparency, we aimed to empower immigrants to make informed decisions and confidently navigate their new lives in Burnaby.

BURNABY TOGETHER COALITION AGAINST RACISM AND HATE



The Burnaby Together Coalition, operating under the Organizations Against Racism and Hate (OARH) program, embarked on a transformative journey aimed at promoting multiculturalism, addressing racism, and fostering inclusive communities. With a strong community-driven approach, the coalition expanded its reach to urban areas, engaging communities in its mission.

The Coalition addressed anti-racism and discrimination by **recognizing on-going education continues to be important to frontline workers and any member in the community**. Based on our learnings on how to best engage the community, we used a hybrid model of offering online and in person events.

WHAT WE DID

We brought educational sessions to the community. We held three sessions of Racism and Active Witnessing that had interpretation in Farsi. Dari/Pashto, Arabic and Chinese. We also organized Break the Silence which included micro-aggressions and unconscious biases biases discussions.

Through a community wide event, Everyone is Welcome: A Burnaby Community Celebration, Burnaby Together **joined community partners to explore issues of racism, stigma, social isolation** and Burnaby's response on decreasing barriers in communication as experienced by newcomers.

We partnered with the Metro Vancouver LIPS for the commemoration of the Elimination of Racial Discrimination. We hosted a diverse panel who **engaged in dialogue to understand racism through an Indigenous, local and educational lens**.

Through the Theatre of the Oppressed, a tool for personal and social empowerment created by and for the community to show real life situations come to life. The participants **explored how best to respond to incidents of racism and hate in our current social context**.

We celebrate the culmination of our year-long endeavor - the Burnaby Together Coalitions' Community Response Toolkit! This exciting project has been a labor of dedication and commitment to creating a safe and inclusive community in Burnaby. This initiative represents a significant milestone in our commitment to fostering a brighter and more equitable future for Burnaby. The toolkit project was implemented to raise awareness and understanding of racism and hate crimes within the Burnaby community. The Burnaby Together members have been active participants in the meetings and in providing feedback on the work of the Table and in participating in the final community sessions of the research on Understanding and Dismantling Incidents of Racism on Racialized Communities in Burnaby.
