

Number Pizza on the Number Plate



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What you need

- Two Paper plates
- Ruler
- Scissors
- Markers





Steps:

1 & 2. Take two plates and draw even lines through the middle, making sure they have been divided evenly

3. Take one plate and write the numbers 1 to 8, clockwise on the plate








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
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4 and 5. Take the other plate and draw dots and numbers on them, from 1 to 8 6. Cut out each "slice", following the line



7. After cutting, there are now 8 "slices" of numbers, and it looks like pizza8. Place the pizza "slices" and the number plate side to side, and talk with your child about the numbers

9 and 10. Take each "slice" of pizza, and place them onto the matching part of the number plate!






Steps:

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11 and 12. Keep placing the "slices" on the matching number, until the plate is filled
